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The meeting was called to order at 8:30am with the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

The commissioners did the following over the past week:

#### Jeff Babcock, IT Administrator

The outage or issue with Brightspeed phone lines from last week appears to be fixed. The problem was that calls could not be made to or from the Brightspeed telephone network. The problem affected several States and was eventually corrected by Brightspeed network engineers. The IT Director traveled to Public Transit's Noble County office in Caldwell to help set up a multi-function printer and a camera system at their satellite office.

Spectrum came to the Morgan County Health Department to port the phone lines from Brightspeed to Spectrum. Several of the Health Department's phone lines have been down since 3 June 2024. Despite several repair requests being sent to Brightspeed, the lines were never fixed. Eventually, the decision was made to port the numbers to Brightspeed. This was completed quickly and full phone functionality has been restored to the Health Department.

Jason Pierce looked at the motor switches for the Courthouse Clock. Both motor switches need replaced and rewired. He is also writing a quote to replace all 4 breaker boxes at the Courthouse and LED lighting to replace old T-12 bulbs for second floor and the Court Room. 5-28-24

Advance H/C repaired RTU 3 condenser coil and found that K-11 compressor 1 has a shorted out thermostat winding. The compressor will need to be replaced, Advanced will be sending a quote within a week. 8-6-24.

Kone Elevator Company did the Pressure Release test and replaced the up button on the first floor and did the service on the elevator. 8-19-24

Held job interview for workforce to hire a replacement for James at the Courthouse, his name is Christian Cambell and he will start on 8-26-24.

Discussed the grass cutting contract and the need for proper maintenance around the shelter, including weed eating around slippery areas. The commissioners decided will call the contractor to ensure all weed eating is done properly.

#### John Wilt, EMA; 911

Discussed the ongoing wait for a response from the Prosecutor's Office regarding the 3130 Poplar Ridge Tower application, which has been pending since last September. Movement is expected after having discussions with key personnel.

Mentioned ongoing work on the HAZMAT plan with Interaction Insight, Sundance, and ComTech

Discussed the need for county fire departments to establish automatic mutual aid response agreements for CAD to assign runs accurately.

Mentioned the receipt of one-time strategic community investment funds and the request to establish a new line item in the 9-1-1 wireless fund.

Discussed the importance of accurate mapping and fire district assignments for effective emergency response.

Shannon Wells met with Misty Crosby and Samual Jurgena from the Mayor's Partnership for Progress regarding Mata adding a second water treatment plant. The purpose of the meeting was to share information regarding water service countywide.

Shannon Wells met with Mike Workman and Cinda Erickson from the Morgan Community Foundation on August 22, 2024 regarding the Animal Companion Fund.

Shannon Wells met with OhioSE and Miba Sinter on August 26, 2024 to discuss employment needs.

#### Randy Williams, Auditor

Discussed the application process for a new credit card program, stressing that the credit is given to the county as a whole and departments can decide how to allocate it. It was discussed between Auditor Williams and the commissioners whether elected officials should have their names on the cards.

Auditor Williams mentioned the county's credit rating and its importance when refinancing bonds. The rating was better than expected despite past financial struggles.

#### Becky Thompson, Dog Warden

The commissioners discussed various animal control issues with Mrs. Thompson, including dealing with stray dogs and cats. There was a specific incident involving a dog that required cutting a tie-out.

It was also mentioned discussed the issue of cat overpopulation and the lack of laws or ordinances to control it. The commissioners considered the possibility of villages adopting ordinances to manage the problem.

# MORGAN COUNTY, OHIO LOCAL EMERGENCY PROCLAMATION

Resolution #\_\_24-427

Whereas, Morgan County, Ohio has been and is immediately threatened by severe drought, and;

as agriculture is one of the prime industries in Morgan County, the effects of the severe drought are currently and will continue to affect the economic health and well-being of the County and the residents thereof.

Now, therefore, we, the Morgan County Board of Commissioners, declare that a state of economic emergency exists in the County and that we hereby invoke and declare those portions of the Ohio Revised Code which are applicable to the conditions and have caused the issuance of this proclamation, to be in full force and effect in the County for the exercise of all necessary emergency authority for protection of the economic welfare and well-being of the people of Morgan County.

Reference is hereby made to all appropriate laws, statutes, ordinances and resolutions, and particularly to Section 902.02 of the Ohio Revised Code.

All public offices and employees of Morgan County are hereby directed to exercise the utmost diligence in the discharge of duties required of them for the duration of the emergency and in execution of emergency laws, regulations, and directives - state and local.

All citizens are called upon and directed to comply with necessary emergency measures, to cooperate with public officials and disaster services forces in executing emergency operation plans, and to obey and comply with the lawful directions of properly identified officers.
